

CANADIAN MUTUAL RECOGNITION AGREEMENT ON THE SALE OF GOODS

Preamble

WHEREAS under the Canadian Free Trade Agreement (CFTA) Chapter Four (Regulatory Notification, Reconciliation, and Cooperation), the Governments of Canada, Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Manitoba, British Columbia, Prince Edward Island, Saskatchewan, Alberta, Newfoundland and Labrador, the Northwest Territories, Yukon, and Nunavut agreed to enter into negotiations to reconcile regulatory measures that act as a barrier to trade, investment, or labour mobility within Canada;

AND WHEREAS the Parties intend to mutually recognize regulatory measures governing the sale of goods in Canada;

AND WHEREAS the Parties agree that the free movement of goods is essential to build a stronger and more productive, competitive, and resilient economy and to open new domestic markets for Canadian businesses;

AND WHEREAS the Parties recognize the importance of achieving public policy objectives and that they retain the right to regulate;

THEREFORE, THE PARTIES AGREE to enter into this Agreement pursuant to CFTA Chapter Four, Part B (Reconciliation) as follows:

A. PURPOSE

The purpose of this Agreement is to enhance trade in goods in Canada by mutually recognizing the requirements contained in regulatory measures of the Parties, such that a good that may be lawfully sold in the territory of one Party may be sold in the territory of all other Parties.

B. RELATIONSHIP TO THE CFTA

1. This Agreement does not modify the rights or obligations of the Parties under the CFTA.
2. This Agreement does not apply to:
 - (a) regional, local, district, or other forms of municipal government; and
 - (b) any measure adopted or maintained by a Party to which CFTA Chapter Eight (General Exceptions) applies.
3. For greater certainty, CFTA Article 202 (Legitimate Objectives) does not apply to this Agreement.

4. The following CFTA provisions apply to this Agreement:
 - (a) Article 1200 (Reaffirmation of Constitutional Powers and Responsibilities);
 - (b) Article 1202 (Relationship to International Agreements); and
 - (c) Article 1207 (Rules of Interpretation), with such changes as the circumstances require.

C. RELATIONSHIP TO OTHER RECONCILIATION AGREEMENTS

1. This Agreement does not modify the rights or obligations of the Parties under reconciliation agreements endorsed by the Regulatory Reconciliation and Cooperation Table (RCT) under CFTA Chapter Four (Regulatory Notification, Reconciliation, and Cooperation), Part B (Reconciliation) prior to this Agreement's effective date.
2. If there is an inconsistency between this Agreement and a reconciliation agreement concluded under CFTA Chapter Four, Part B before this Agreement's effective date, the previously endorsed reconciliation agreement prevails to the extent of the inconsistency. For greater certainty, any such reconciliation agreement may prevail only as between the Parties that are party to that reconciliation agreement.

D. SCOPE AND COVERAGE

1. This Agreement applies to requirements contained in regulatory measures governing the sale of a good of a Party listed in Chapters 25 to 97 of the Harmonized Commodity Description and Coding System (HS 2022 Edition).
2. For the Government of Canada:
 - (a) this Agreement applies only to a federal requirement that pertains to the interprovincial movement of a good; and
 - (b) subject to paragraph (a), Section E (Mutual Recognition) applies to a federal requirement only when there is also a provincial or territorial requirement that is in respect of the same aspect or element of the good and is intended to achieve a similar objective.

E. MUTUAL RECOGNITION

1. Each Party shall ensure that a good that may be lawfully sold in the territory of another Party, in compliance with the requirements contained in regulatory measures applicable in that other Party, may be sold in its territory without having to meet an applicable requirement.

2. Paragraph 1 does not prevent a Party from applying a requirement on the sale of a good produced in its territory or imported from a non-Party into it.
3. For greater certainty, paragraph 1 does not apply to a regulatory measure respecting:
 - (a) how a good may be sold or the conduct of sellers;
 - (b) who may sell, purchase, possess, or use a good;
 - (c) a requirement to obtain or maintain a licence, registration, or other authorization to sell a good;
 - (d) the contractual aspects of the sale of a good; or
 - (e) the circumstances in which a good may or may not be sold,

provided the regulatory measure is not applied in a manner which would constitute a means of arbitrary or unjustifiable discrimination between Parties where the same conditions prevail, or a disguised restriction on trade.

F. APPLICABLE REQUIREMENTS

General

1. Notwithstanding Section E (Mutual Recognition), if a Party:
 - (a) requires a good that may be lawfully sold in the territory of another Party to meet an applicable requirement; or
 - (b) prohibits the sale of a good that may be lawfully sold in the territory of another Party,it shall identify that requirement or prohibition in its Schedule to Annex A (Applicable Requirements).
2. Subject to paragraph 5, an entry in a Party's Schedule to Annex A shall specify:
 - (a) the good or goods subject to the applicable requirement or prohibition;
 - (b) the regulatory measure, with a description of the applicable requirement or prohibition;
 - (c) the Party or Parties whose goods are subject to the applicable requirement or prohibition; and

- (d) the reasons for the applicable requirement or prohibition, which may include the absence of a corresponding regulatory measure in another Party.
3. For greater certainty, a Province may, through its Schedule to Annex A and in accordance with paragraph 2, elect to apply mutual recognition only to a requirement contained in a regulatory measure of another Party when the other Party's requirement is in respect of the same aspect or element of the good and is intended to achieve a similar objective as the requirement of the Province applying mutual recognition.

Amending Schedule

4. A Party may amend its Schedule to Annex A at any time by providing written notice to all Parties, which shall include:
- (a) the Party's amended Schedule to Annex A;
 - (b) an explanation of the amendment or a redline version of the Party's amended Schedule to Annex A; and
 - (c) the date on which the amendment comes into effect.

Transitional Measure

5. A Party may use a single entry in its Schedule to Annex A to cover all applicable requirements or prohibitions the Party adopts or maintains that do not correspond to any regulatory measures of another Party.
6. For the purposes of this Section, a requirement corresponds to another when it concerns a similar aspect of the good for which the approval of sale was granted by the other jurisdiction.
7. A Party's entry taken pursuant to paragraph 5 expires 12 months after this Agreement comes into effect. A Party may renew the entry for up to 12 months by providing written notice to the Committee on Internal Trade (Committee). For greater certainty, an entry taken pursuant to paragraph 5 expires no later than 24 months after this Agreement comes into effect.

G. ADMINISTRATION

The Parties shall undertake a review of this Agreement within five years of the effective date to assess its scope, operation, governance, and effectiveness.

H. AMENDMENTS TO THIS AGREEMENT

1. The Parties may agree in writing to amend this Agreement. Any such amendment will come into effect on the date agreed to by the Parties.
2. Notwithstanding paragraph 1:
 - (a) an amendment to a Party's Schedule to Annex A (Applicable Requirements) shall be made pursuant to Section F.4 (Applicable Requirements); and
 - (b) an amendment to a Party's contact point in Annex B (Contact Points) may be made by providing notice to the Secretariat.

I. EFFECTIVE DATE

1. This Agreement will come into effect when at least two Parties have signed it ("effective date").
2. A Party may indicate in its Schedule to Annex A that this Agreement will come into effect for that Party on or before June 30, 2026.

J. ACCESSION, WITHDRAWAL, AND TERMINATION

1. After the effective date, any Party to the CFTA that is not a Party to this Agreement may accede to this Agreement by accepting its terms.
2. A Party may withdraw from this Agreement by giving written notice to the other Parties, which shall contain the date the withdrawal comes into effect. Withdrawal shall not come into effect less than 180 days from the date when written notice is delivered. If a Party withdraws from this Agreement, the Agreement will remain in effect for all other Parties.
3. This Agreement may be terminated upon mutual agreement of all Parties.

K. PUBLICATION, NOTICES, AND CONTACT POINTS

1. This Agreement and any amendment to it will be published on the CFTA website.
2. Written notices, information, or documents required by, or in connection with, this Agreement shall be delivered to the Secretariat. The Secretariat will distribute written notices, information, or documents to other Parties as required.
3. Each Party shall designate a contact point in Annex B (Contact Points) to receive notices, answer reasonable enquiries, and provide information relating to its measures and other matters covered by this Agreement.

4. Each Party shall promptly develop tools to implement this Agreement, in particular:
 - (a) to allow a Party to verify that a good may be lawfully sold in the territory of another Party in compliance with a requirement contained in a regulatory measure applicable in that other Party; and
 - (b) to ensure that all other Parties are notified following the removal, amendment, or adoption of a requirement contained in a regulatory measure governing the sale of a good that may materially impact the application of this Agreement.

L. LANGUAGE

This Agreement and any amendment to it have been and shall be made and executed in English and French, and both versions are equally authoritative.

M. DISPUTE RESOLUTION

1. CFTA Chapter Ten (Dispute Resolution), Part A (Government-to-Government Dispute Resolution) applies to this Agreement.
2. The Parties may develop additional tools, mechanisms, or processes to address disputes over the interpretation or application of this Agreement in addition to CFTA Chapter Ten, Part A through the Committee.
3. Notwithstanding paragraph 1, a Party may not, prior to July 1, 2026, request the formation of a Panel to examine whether an actual or proposed regulatory measure of another Party is inconsistent with this Agreement. For greater certainty, a Party may request consultations with the other Party before July 1, 2026.

N. COSTS

1. Any costs and expenses of a Party in relation to this Agreement shall be borne by that Party unless otherwise agreed to in writing.
2. This Agreement does not amend, repeal, or otherwise modify any existing or future arrangement between the Parties, or between the Parties and any other persons, respecting cost sharing or funding for the RCT or Secretariat.

O. COUNTERPARTS

This Agreement may be executed in counterpart, in which case:

- (a) the counterparts together shall constitute one Agreement; and

- (b) communication of execution by a PDF transmitted by email to the Parties shall constitute effective delivery.

P. DEFINITIONS

1. Unless a contrary intention is expressed in this Agreement, the definitions found in CFTA Chapter Thirteen (Definitions) apply to this Agreement.
2. For the purposes of this Agreement:

applicable requirement means a requirement contained in a regulatory measure that a Party applies to the sale of a good in its territory, even though that good may be lawfully sold in the territory of another Party;

Agreement means this Canadian Mutual Recognition Agreement on the Sale of Goods;

CFTA means the Canadian Free Trade Agreement, as amended;

CFTA website includes any website operated by the Secretariat;

effective date means the “effective date” as defined in Section I (Effective Date);

Parties means, as the context requires, all or some of the Parties to this Agreement;

Party means any signatory to this Agreement; and

regulatory measure includes any decree, regulation, standard, order, requirement, procedure, process, assessment, legislation, or other instrument, with the exception of occupational standards.

The identification of a requirement or regulatory measure in this Schedule does not mean the identified requirement or regulatory measure is necessarily within the scope of, or subject to, this Agreement or to the *Canadian Free Trade Agreement*. Without limiting the generality of the forgoing, the identification of a requirement or regulatory measure in this Schedule does not prejudice, waive, or otherwise impair the right of Saskatchewan, or any Saskatchewan government entity, to argue in any proceeding (including before a court, tribunal, panel, or any other dispute resolution body) that:
 - a. a requirement or regulatory measure identified in this Schedule is not subject to mutual recognition due to paragraph 3 of Section E (Mutual Recognition) of this Agreement; or
 - b. a requirement or regulatory measure identified in this Schedule is not subject to mutual recognition due to Chapter Eight (General Exceptions) of the *Canadian Free Trade Agreement*.
3. A rationale identified in this Schedule is not necessarily exhaustive of the regulatory rationale for that requirement. The identification of a rationale in this Schedule does not prejudice, waive, or otherwise impair the right of Saskatchewan, or any Saskatchewan government entity, to advance additional or alternate rationale for a given requirement in any proceeding (including before a court, tribunal, panel, or any other dispute resolution body).
4. A requirement or regulatory measure identified in this Schedule may be amended or repealed, subject only to notice requirements imposed by Saskatchewan law, if applicable. An amendment to a requirement or regulatory measure identified in this Schedule may be affected by the amendment or repeal of a standard or other instrument not listed in this Schedule, if that standard or other instrument is integrated by reference into a regulatory measure listed in this Schedule.
5. Subheadings in this Schedule are provided for organizational purposes only, and do not limit the scope of an entry in this Schedule.
